Although the law was repealed after India's independence, its social consequences continued to affect these communities for generations.

### Identity of Nomadic Communities

Nomadic communities possess unique cultural identities characterised by distinct languages, customs, traditions, and occupational practices. Their mobility has historically enabled them to adapt to changing economic conditions and environmental circumstances. However, their migratory lifestyle has often resulted in social exclusion and difficulties in obtaining official recognition. Many families lack adequate identity documentation, including voter cards, ration cards, and residential certificates, which limits their access to government welfare schemes and public services.

### Socio-Economic Status of Nomadic Communities in Karnataka

Nomadic and semi-nomadic communities in Karnataka—numbering over 40 distinct groups—face severe marginalisation. Characterised by extreme poverty, very low literacy rates, and a lack of permanent housing, they survive primarily through traditional livelihoods, street performances, and petty trades.

**Shelter and Living Conditions:** Many families remain landless and live in temporary settlements or tents. Basic amenities like sanitation, electricity, and clean drinking water are virtually nonexistent in these makeshift colonies.

**Livelihood Instability:** Most rely on traditional occupations (e.g., street performances, folk arts, basket weaving, traditional ironwork, or animal rearing). Modern industrialisation, strict environmental laws (like the Wildlife Protection Act), and urbanisation have severely disrupted these ancestral trades.

**Low Literacy and Education:** The nomadic lifestyle, coupled with extreme poverty, forces children into the unorganised labour sector rather than schools, resulting in generational illiteracy.

**Exclusion from Social Benefits:** Because of constant mobility, many lack basic government documents (Aadhaar, ration cards, and caste certificates), severely hindering their access to welfare schemes and targeted reservations.

**Marginalisation of Women:** Women in these tribes carry a heavy burden of domestic and economic responsibility. They suffer from poor healthcare access and are disproportionately affected by a lack of stable housing and social security.

### Socio-Economic Challenges of Nomadic Communities in Karnataka

**1. Educational Challenges:** Education remains one of the major concerns among nomadic communities. Frequent migration disrupts children's schooling and contributes to high dropout rates. Major educational challenges include Lack of access to schools, Irregular attendance due to migration, Poverty and child labour, and Low literacy rates, Limited educational awareness.

**2. Employment and Livelihood Issues:** Traditional occupations are declining due to modernisation and market competition. Consequently, many nomadic families depend on informal labour and low-paying jobs. Common livelihood challenges include Unemployment and underemployment, Decline of traditional occupations, Seasonal income fluctuations, Economic insecurity, and lack of skill development opportunities

**3. Healthcare Challenges:** Healthcare accessibility remains limited because many nomadic settlements are located in remote areas. Major healthcare issues include Poor access to medical facilities, Malnutrition among women and children, Lack of health awareness, and inadequate maternal and child healthcare services.

**4. Housing and Settlement Problems:** The absence of permanent housing remains a significant challenge. Many nomadic families reside in temporary shelters without adequate sanitation, drinking water, and electricity facilities. Housing-related issues include Lack of land ownership, Temporary settlements, Poor living conditions, and inadequate civic amenities

#### **Social Exclusion and Marginalisation**

Nomadic communities often experience social discrimination and exclusion. Historical stereotypes and social stigma continue to affect their interaction with mainstream society. As a result, they face barriers in accessing education, employment, and social welfare benefits. Social exclusion also contributes to low levels of political participation and representation, further limiting their ability to advocate for their rights and interests.

**Barriers to Welfare Schemes:** Lack of awareness, documentation issues, and administrative hurdles prevent many families from benefiting from government welfare programs.

**Cultural Identity Challenges:** Modernisation and social pressures threaten the preservation of their traditional customs, languages, and cultural practices.

**Limited Social Mobility:** Persistent poverty, discrimination, and inadequate access to resources restrict their ability to improve their socio-economic status and integrate into mainstream society.
