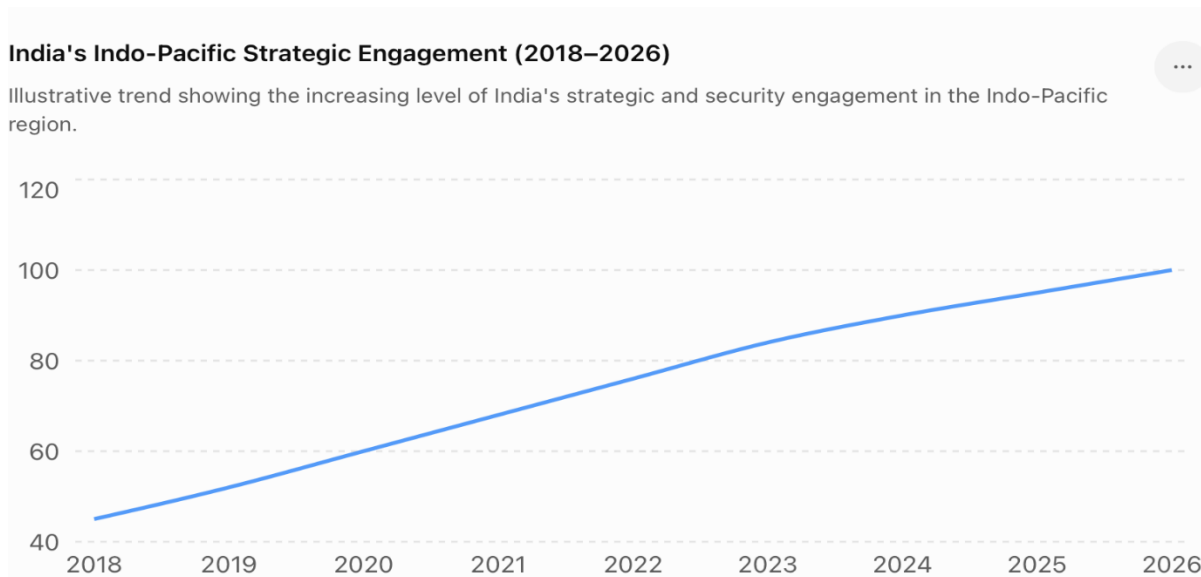
contributing to the maintenance of a stable, secure, and
